Service-Learning

AGRI 2900 is a service learning course.

Service-Learning is defined as a course-based, credit bearing educational experience in which students (a) participate in an organized service activity that meets identified community needs and (b) reflect on the service activity in such a way as to gain further understanding of course content, a broader appreciation of the discipline, and an enhanced sense of civic responsibility (from Bringle and Hatcher, 1995).

Course Objectives

Based on the goal of the leadership development foundation and prerequisite course, HRE 2723, the overall goal of this course is for students to **practice** the development of their leadership skills in a structured environment. At the end of the course, students will be able to

- Better apply basic concepts of leadership development.
- Evaluate their leadership strengths and weaknesses, including areas of growth.
- Evaluate the leadership skills in others, including areas of growth.

Required materials

Exploring Leadership: for college students who want to make a difference (2nd Edition). Susan R. Komives, Nance Lucas, and Timothy R. McMahan (Jossey-Bass, 2006)

Additional Materials:

Additional readings may be added to the calendar throughout the semester. Handouts will be presented to support course discussion areas during the term. All students are expected to have active LSU e-mail accounts and Moodle, and should be prepared to communicate with the professor using this technology. Students should regularly check the course website for class updates/assignments. The instructors will often make Power Points notes available online before each class. Students are expected to print out copies and bring them to each lecture.

Course Requirements

- 1. With the exception of designated university holidays, class will meet every week. Students are expected to be in class to discuss their experiences.
- 2. Students are required to devote (and document) no fewer than 30 hours of service outside of class time. Students should complete 3 hours of service per week.
- 3. Students are required to keep a log of their weekly hours which must include the date and time. The log must be signed by the supervisor at the site in which their service is being completed. Log sheets must be turned in at the beginning of each class meeting.
- 4. Students are required to submit to the instructor a weekly journal entry summarizing their experiences for the week. The journal entry should be a maximum of one doubled-spaced page per week. The journal is due at the beginning of each class meeting. Late papers will be deducted two (2) points per day immediately following class time.
- 5. Students are required to secure instructor approval of their practicum plan of work.
- 6. Students are required to complete a formative and summative evaluation of their practicum.
- 7. Students are required to write a reflective paper explaining how their experiences relate to the five components of the relation leadership model.

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8. Students will complete 2 projects that are congruent with course and site objectives.

Grading Criteria

Grading for the course will be based on the following:

Reflection

Reflection is an important part of the experience gained in a service-learning class.

In this course, reflection will be accomplished in 3 ways:

- 1. Weekly journal entries. At the end of each week, students will write an essay to reflect on their experiences at the St. Vincent de Paul site and how these experiences relate to the principles of leadership they have learned in HRE 2723. The experiences should connect with the course content, and indicate an analysis of how they fit together. The instructor will provide direction and guidance for the reflections using the ORID Model. Also, questions will be provided for students to address in each journal reflection essay.
- 2. In class discussion sessions which will allow the students to share their experiences with other students in the class. These sessions will allow students, instructor and community partner an opportunity to share experiences with other students and learn from one another.
- 3. Final reflection paper and oral presentation. This final report, as indicated in the course requirements, will summarize their semester experiences and how they relate to the five components of the relation leadership model. The oral presentation will consist of the students sharing their experiences and reflections with each other and the community partner.

Projects

- 1. Project 1 will include serving a meal at the Bishop Ott Men's Shelter during the 3rd class period. Students will plan the menu and work with the course instructors in purchasing the meal from an authorized vendor for the Agriculture Residential College.
- 2. Project 2 will include the planning, fundraising, ingredient purchase, and preparation of a meal for the Women and Children's Shelter at St. Vincent de Paul.

CLASS POLICIES
